## LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

# WHERE WE GATHER

## Enji Maawnjiding “Where We Gather”

Built in 1993, Enji Maawnjiding is a gathering place for Indigenous students. It supports shared learning, cultural exchange, and mutual support by hosting events throughout the year. The Centre offers workshops to foster community, promote a good life, and encourage lifelong friendships. Located in G-Wing, it features a kitchen, servery, classrooms, and faculty offices, creating a welcoming environment. It exemplifies the achievements of the Indigenous Education Council and Sault College's commitment to alternative educational strategies that address the diverse needs of Indigenous students.

## Wiigwaasgamig “Birch Bark House” Sacred Fire Arbour

Sault College completed the Wiigwaasgamig “Birch Bark House” Sacred Fire Arbour in 2017, situated outside the Indigenous Student Centre, Enji Maawnjiding. It serves as a site for spiritual ceremonies, teachings, and community events. The arbour was funded by Sault College and the Sault College Students' Union and named by Elders-in-Residence, Barbara Nolan and Ted Recollet. “Wiigwaasgamig,” meaning Birch Bark House in Anishinaabemowin, reflects traditional teachings and the arbour's design.



Recognizing the importance of traditional knowledge, Sault College is pleased to provide Elders-in-Residence services. Our Elders are available to students and staff for one-on-one mentoring, talking circles, traditional teachings, ceremonies, and cultural curriculum support.

**Barbara Nolan**, an Anishinaabe Kwe (woman) from Garden River First Nation, is a fluent speaker and advocate for the preservation of Anishinaabemowin (the Ojibwe language). As a respected language holder, she shares traditional teachings and offers guidance on spiritual, emotional, and mental well-being. Barbara's commitment to cultural revitalization helps students reconnect with their language and heritage, providing a sense of belonging and pride in their identity.



**Ted Re collet**, a member of the Wikwemikong Unceded Territory, brings a wealth of knowledge in traditional ceremonies, land-based education, and community healing. His experience in guiding individuals through spiritual journeys and his passion for the well-being of community deeply influences his approach to supporting students. Ted's leadership and teachings inspire students to embrace Indigenous ways of knowing and living.

Through workshops, one-on-one mentorship, and cultural events, Barbara and Ted create a welcoming environment where Indigenous students feel supported on their educational journeys. Their presence also invites non-Indigenous students and staff to learn about and respect Indigenous traditions, fostering reconciliation and inclusivity on campus.

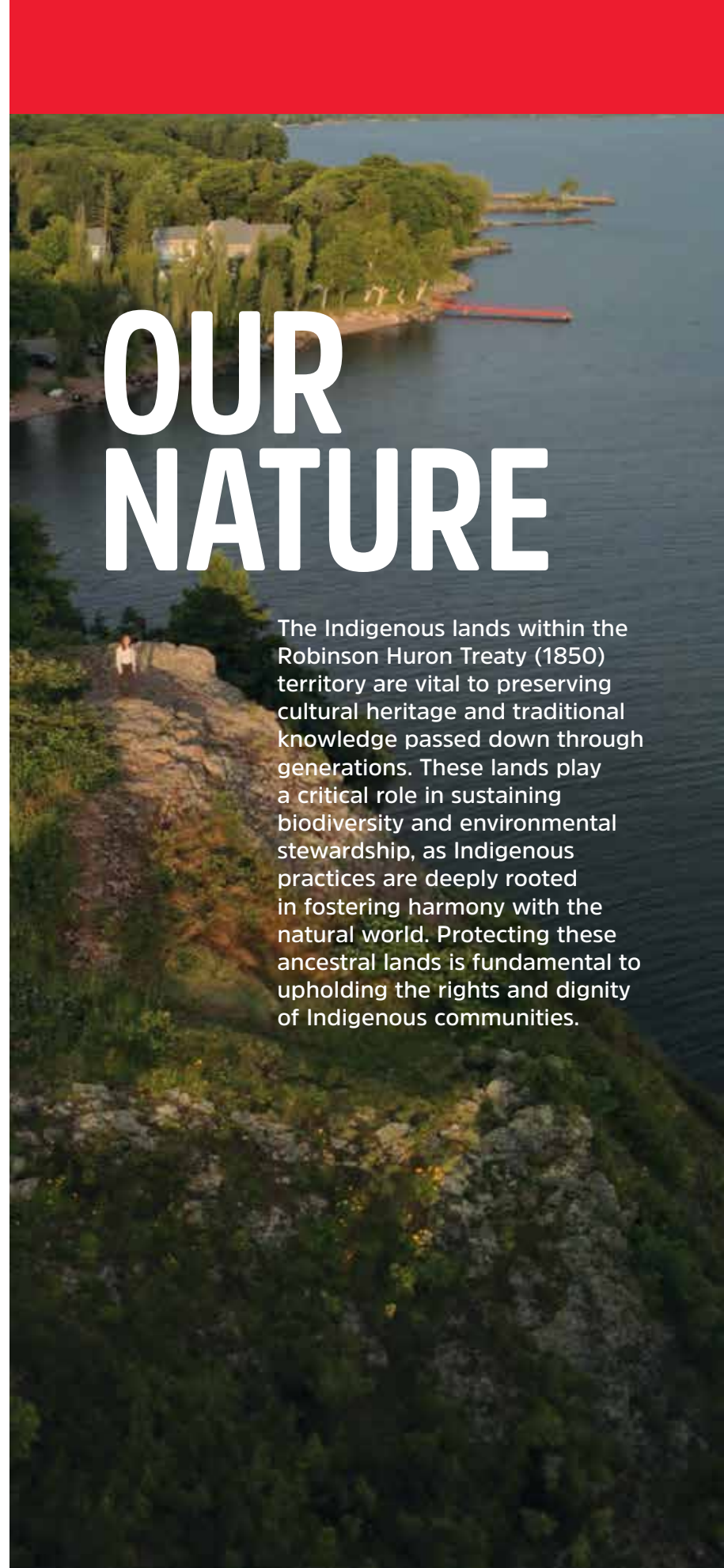

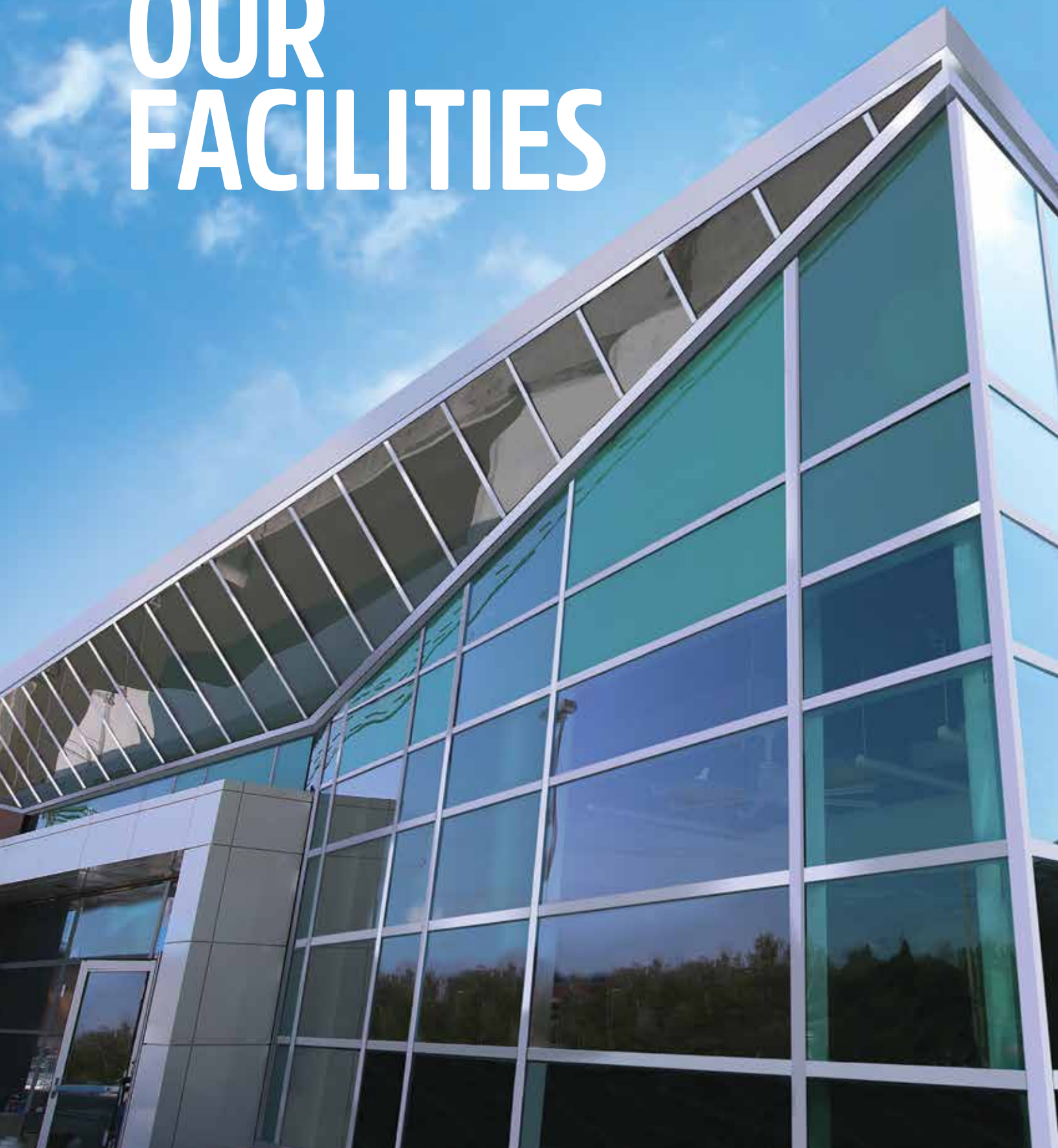
