


## GET INVOLVED!



Our Indigenous community at the College is here to support you through culture, community, and connection—and we also know how to have a little fun along the way. The Indigenous Students' Union (ISU) helps plan a full calendar of engaging events that celebrate tradition and bring people together. From canoe races, powwow visits, and drum socials to beaded poppy workshops, bannock on a stick, chocolate bar bingo, and even a holiday trolley train surprise, there's something for everyone. Whether you're looking to connect with culture, meet new friends, or just take a break from class, you're always welcome to join in.





Recognizing the importance of traditional knowledge, Sault College is pleased to provide Elders-in-Residence services. Our Elders are available to students and staff for one-on-one mentoring, talking circles, traditional teachings, ceremonies, and cultural curriculum support.

Barbara Nolan, an Anishinaabe Kwe (woman) from Garden River First Nation, is a fluent speaker and advocate for the preservation of Anishinaabemowin (the Ojibwe language). As a respected language holder, she shares traditional teachings and offers guidance on spiritual, emotional, and mental well-being. Barbara's commitment to cultural revitalization helps students reconnect with their language and heritage, providing a sense of belonging and pride in their identity.

Ted Recollet, a member of the Wikwemikong Unceded Territory, brings a wealth of knowledge in traditional ceremonies, land-based education, and community healing. His experience in guiding individuals through spiritual journeys and his passion for the well-being of community deeply influences his approach to supporting students. Ted's leadership and teachings inspire students to embrace Indigenous ways of knowing and living.

Through workshops, one-on-one mentorship, and cultural events, Barbara and Ted create a welcoming environment where Indigenous students feel supported on their educational journeys. Their presence also invites non-Indigenous students and staff to learn about and respect Indigenous traditions, fostering reconciliation and inclusivity on campus.



# FUNDING YOUR EDUCATION

We're committed to supporting First Nations, Métis, and Inuit learners every step of the way. If you're starting or continuing your postsecondary journey, one of the most important first steps is understanding the financial supports available to you—including funding through your band or community.

#### Band Sponsorship – Post-Secondary Student Support Program (PSSSP)

If you're an eligible Status First Nations, you may be able to access financial support for part-time or full-time studies through your First Nation community. This funding—often through the Post-Secondary Student Support Program (PSSSP)—can help cover tuition, books, living costs, and sometimes travel. Policies, eligibility, and application processes vary by community, so reach out to your band's education office early. Our team can help connect you with your education officer.

Inuit students who formerly received funding through PSSSP should apply through the Inuit Post-Secondary Education Strategy.

### **Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP)**

OSAP can help pay for college or university through grants and loans—and many Indigenous students qualify for grants that don't have to be repaid. Apply online at **osap.gov.on.ca** and be sure to self-identify as Indigenous to unlock additional funding and supports. Sault College's Student Financial Assistance (SFA) team is here to guide you through the process.

#### **Bursaries, Awards and Scholarships**

Sault College offers an Indigenous Student
Bursary to help with the costs of your education.
You can apply once you're registered in a
full-time program. This is a great option if you're
not fully sponsored or if you need extra support
for things like books or supplies. Reach out to the
SFA early in the semester—they'll
walk you through the application process.
