WHERE WE GATHER

Enji Maawnjiding means “Where We Gather.” It’s a welcoming space created for Indigenous students to connect, share knowledge, and support each other through cultural events and community gatherings.

Since its opening in 1993, Enji has been a safe space to hang out, study, and gather for events. Enji features a kitchen and servery, study and lounge space, and is connected to classrooms and faculty offices—all designed to create a warm, inclusive atmosphere. It reflects the hard work of the Indigenous Education Council and our commitment to providing alternative educational strategies for the needs of all Indigenous students.



Honouring Traditional Knowledge

Recognizing the importance of Indigenous knowledge, Sault College is committed to creating meaningful opportunities for students, employees, and the College community to learn from Elders and Knowledge Keepers throughout the academic year.

Students and employees can connect with Elders and Knowledge Keepers through programming offered in Enji Maawnjiding and the Indigenous Studies department. Gather for one-on-one guidance, talking circles, traditional teachings, ceremonies, workshops, cultural events, and language learning.

The Elders and Knowledge Keepers bring diverse teachings rooted in the traditions and Nations of this region. Their guidance reflects the rich history, cultures, and relationships of the lands where Sault College is situated. Through their teachings, they strengthen connections between communities, build respect for Indigenous ways of knowing, and help students develop a deeper understanding of the people, histories, and cultures that shape us.

Elders and Knowledge Keepers play an essential role here. Their wisdom, lived experiences, and cultural teachings enrich learning, support student success and well-being, and contribute to an environment where Indigenous knowledge is valued and shared. This allows our College community to continue its commitment to reconciliation, mutual respect, and build meaningful relationships with nearby Indigenous communities.

YOUR CELEBRATIONS

Celebrating our Indigenous heritage is important here—and our Indigenous Community Engagement Coordinator is dedicated to planning social and cultural activities for our Indigenous students year-round.

In collaboration with staff, the Indigenous Students' Union, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, as well as First Nations and Indigenous organizations, the coordinator brings Indigenous traditions, teachings, and community connections to life across campus. Indigenous students can be involved with traditional teachings, ceremonies, craft nights, feasts, potlucks, socials, guest speakers, cultural workshops, and community celebrations.

These events and collaborations create meaningful opportunities for students to learn, connect, and celebrate Indigenous cultures in a welcoming environment. Family and friends are always welcome to join, helping to create a strong sense of belonging for our College community.



Wiigwaasgamig “Birch Bark House” Sacred Fire Arbour

The Wiigwaasgamig “Birch Bark House” Sacred Fire Arbour is situated outside the Indigenous Student Centre, Enji Maawnjiding. It serves as a site for spiritual ceremonies, teachings, and community events. In 2017, the arbour was funded by Sault College and the Sault College Students' Union. The name “Wiigwaasgamig” was given by former Elders-in-Residence, Barbara Nolan and Ted Recollet—meaning Birch Bark House in Anishinaabemowin—reflecting traditional teachings and the arbour’s design.

FUNDING YOUR EDUCATION

We're committed to supporting First Nations, Métis, and Inuit learners every step of the way. If you're starting or continuing your postsecondary journey, one of the most important first steps is understanding the financial supports available to you—including funding through your band or community.

Band Sponsorship – Post-Secondary Student Support Program (PSSSP)

If you're an eligible Status First Nations student, you may be able to access financial support for part-time or full-time studies through your First Nation community.

This funding—often through the Post-Secondary Student Support Program (PSSSP)—can help cover tuition, books, living costs, and sometimes travel. Policies, eligibility, and application processes vary by community, so reach out to your band's education office early. Our team can help connect you with your education officer if needed.

Inuit students who formerly received funding through PSSSP should apply through the Inuit Post-Secondary Education Strategy.

Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP)

OSAP can help pay for college or university through grants and loans—and many Indigenous students qualify for grants that don't have to be repaid.

Apply online at osap.ca and be sure to self-identify as Indigenous to unlock additional funding and supports. Sault College's Student Financial Assistance (SFA) team is here to guide you through the process.

Bursaries, Awards & Scholarships

We offer an Indigenous Student Bursary to help with the costs of your education. You can apply once you're registered in a full-time program. This is a great option if you're not fully sponsored or if you need extra support for things like books or supplies. Reach out to SFA early in the semester—they'll walk you through the application process. Find more scholarships, bursaries, and awards at saultcollege.ca/awards
